Selected Working Papers

“The Threat of Autocracy Promotion: International Attacks on Democracy as Domestic Signaling.” Formalizes a model of use of attacks on democracy as domestic signaling by non-democratic regimes.

“Autocracy Promotion: Trade, Finance and Cooperative Behavior Models.” Develops a measure of cooperative behavior among autocracies based on preferential trade, finance, and international organization arrangements.

“Semi-supervised Machine Learning and Populist Rhetoric: A First Step to Measuring Populist and Ideological Rhetoric in Opaque Societies.” Creates a measure of populism using a Latent Semantic Scaling model on a corpus of UN General Assembly speeches, validated against existing measures and alternate models.
